INTERNET SAFETY

We would like to draw the attention of our parents to the subject of Internet safety. We advise parents of the need for vigilance. It is very difficult to police the Internet particularly if young people have Internet devices in their bedroom. There are occasions when Internet messaging has been problematic and problems have carried on in school. We simply wish to remind parents to note what is happening with your child and to be mindful about the friends created on social media.

Internet Safety in the Home

The following points are advised by various agencies to ensure Internet safety in the home. Parents may wish to create an agreement with their children to ensure that they are not made vulnerable by the way they use the Internet.

- We will never give out personal information such as our last name, address or
 phone number. We should also not give out the name of our school, our city, our siblings, our sports team or our parent's
 workplace.
- 2. **We will not give our passwords to anyone outside our family**. We agree to have user names to use while we are on the Internet. I will not change the settings for my computer or my password without my parent's permission.
- 3. **We all agree to limit our online time so that it doesn't interfere with other activities**. We agree to follow the time limits that our family sets and not let the Internet take time away from homework, sports, face- to-face interactions or family time.
- 4. I will never accept a friend request unless my parents know about it. I am aware that strangers may attempt to befriend me. I would never invite a stranger to my home without my parent's consent. I will not accept the friendship of strangers on social media without my parent's consent.
- 5. **I will never meet an online friend in person**. Just as I stay away from strangers on the street, I will be careful about strangers on the Internet. If anyone ever asks to meet with me off line, I will notify my parents immediately.
- 6. I will tell my mum or dad right away if I come across something that makes me feel uncomfortable. If anyone uses bad language or mentions things that make me uncomfortable, I will immediately log off and tell my parents.
- 7. I will not remain on or click on a page that says, "For Over 18 Years Only." If this happens, I will log off and I will let my parents know. I understand that I'm only a click away from bad sites and that these pages are definitely not for me.
- 8. **I will only download pictures and files with my parent's permission**. Some of these files may contain inappropriate pictures or dangerous viruses that could mess up our computer.
- 9. I will not send pictures of my family or myself to anyone online. The only way that I am allowed to do this is if my parents say it is all right.
- 10. I will be safe everywhere. I will follow the same Internet safety rules at my friends' houses, at school and at the library that I do while I'm at home.
- 11. I understand that nothing is private on the Internet. I agree that my mum or dad can read my mail or check the sites that I have been visiting not because they don't trust me but because they just want to make sure that I am safe.
- 12. I will be respectful and courteous in all my interactions on the Internet in the same way that I am respectful and courteous in my face to face interactions.


Library News - Mrs Simone Cullinan

Stage 1 Coordinator - Mrs Jessica Zeitouni













On Tuesday 9th of May, Year 2 went on an excursion to Rouse Hill House and Farm. This fabulous excursion gave students the opportunity to explore the working areas of the former farm and investigate what life would have been like for children living there in the late 1800s. Students visited the old milking shed and explored the beautiful stables that the Rouse Family built for their horses. They learnt about the vital role of horses at the time, as an essential means of transport and for getting work done around the farm. They shifted bags of chaff, polished saddles in the tack-room and heard what poet Banjo Patterson had to say about the Rouse 'Crooked R' brand. As chores would have been part of daily life for children living on the farm in the late 1800s, students had the chance to experience some of these for themselves; feeding the chooks, hanging out the washing and pumping water.

They also had the opportunity to learn first hand about what school life was like in the late 19th century. Students dressed in period costume – straw hats, plus cotton pinafores for the girls and sailor collars or coats for the boys – and then met their schoolmistress or master to begin the school day. After saluting the British flag, the class marched into the 1880s schoolroom, where they sang the national anthem, *God Save the Queen* and prepared to start the first lesson. In this lesson students took part in a re-creation of late 19th-century classroom activities, led by highly-trained staff, who were also in costume and in character as 1880s school teachers. Hands-on activities included practising writing on slates, completing a science lesson, a sewing lesson and a drawing lesson as well as an outdoor physical education drill and maypole dancing in the yard, enabling students to make vivid comparisons between schooling then and now. It was a fantastic day for all!






What is the award?

The Award is a leading structured (non-formal education) youth development program, empowering all young Australians between age

14 to 25 to explore their full potential regardless of their location or circumstance. The Award is a fully inclusive program and has no social, political, or religious affiliations.

How is an Award Achieved?

Each young person who takes part in the Award learns a skill, improves their physical wellbeing, volunteers in their community and experiences a team adventure in a new environment. All Participants are supported by a network of adult Award Leaders, Assessors, Supervisors, and mentors.

Each level of the Award has four sections:

The key elements of our program are:

- Open to all between the ages of 14 to 25.
- Three levels: Bronze, Silver, and Gold, each progressively more challenging.
- Four Sections: Physical Recreation, Skill, Service, Adventurous Journey plus Residential Project (Gold Level only).

Achieving an Award recognises individual goal setting and self-improvement through persistence and achievement.

What impact does the Award have on a young person? Through this challenging journey of self-discovery, our Participants:

• Are equipped and empowered to achieve their personal best:

- Learn to take responsibility for their goals and choices;
- Become connected to and actively engaged within their immediate community;
- Make a real difference to society through their positive contributions and involvement;
- Learn to persevere and overcome barriers to success;
- Learn important life skills; and

Increase their career opportunities.

A longstanding global network

Today more than 140 countries have adopted The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award program with over 8 million young people having participated worldwide. Locally over 700,000 young people have completed the Award in Australia in the past 57 years, with on average 40,000 very diverse participants annually working towards achieving an Award.

The Fundamentals of the Award

- Regular participation in activities is required to meet the time requirements of each Award Section and Level.
- Focuses on capacity building by encouraging all young Australians to make independent decisions and to negotiate priorities through participation.
- Provides a framework that works with all young people in any conceivable situation. This includes youth at risk, Indigenous youth, new refugees, marginalised youth, young people in regional and remote communities, and young people with disabilities. Assists with the provision of social infrastructure in the community and draws together and connects people, institutions and generations with the common purpose of youth development and inclusion.

Drama Special Effects Incursion - Miss Nancy Loulach

On Tuesday the 3rd of May, our Year 10 Drama students were visited by Krystal K, a makeup artist who specialises in applying special effects makeup. As part of this visit students participated in a live tutorial on special effects makeup and learnt how to create cuts, scars, open wounds, burns and bruises on their skin. The day was fun, entertaining, creative and educational and our students had a wonderful time!

As part of our unit this term, students must create a character within the horror genre and design their own special effects makeup and costume for their chosen character. They will present this character to an audience in a monologue that will provoke tension and suspense to all those who watch.



By participating in this incursion, students learnt about the importance of following a clear design process when creating a character. They also learnt about the importance of stage production elements and how an audience is impacted by everything presented to them on stage.

After the makeup artist delivered her tutorial, students then replicated their horror looks on each other. Frightening both teachers and students alike with their bloody faces and open wounds, our Year 10 drama students were the topic of conversation across the school! Students will replicate these looks as part of their assessment task in Week 8. They did extremely well and it was great to see them building their confidence and enjoying themselves in the process.
