On Monday, St Charbel's College attended a liturgy to commence the season of Lent, to recall our beginnings and reflect on what we anticipate to achieve during Lent.

Ash Monday is the commencement of Lent. It is a time when we focus on our relationship with God and slow down to reflect on our lives and our personal values. Today we need to emphasise less on fasting and more on penance involving good deeds and prayer. O most Holy Father, Son and Holy Spirit.


Help us make good use of every day you give us.

Mission and Religious Education

Last Friday, our Year 7 cohort received fruitful Catechesis on the Creed and our beliefs as Maronite Catholics in the picturesque mountainside in Appin. Students were grouped into their House Colours to better appreciate their respective house Patrons and to connect with their team mates and teachers. Our Maronite Monks offered mass to our students along with the sacrament of confession. Students also participated in sporting activities and group discussions on their faith journey in preparation for this Holy season of Lent.











PRIMARY

Students in the Primary School have settled in well and are working hard under the guidance of their teachers. They received their ashes in a special liturgy that was held on Ash Monday to commemorate the beginning of Lent.

A letter went home last week reminding parents to be vigilant and monitor their children when online, particularly in light of the latest scare regarding the Momo Challenge, in which a character is popping up on social media and scaring children. The school encourages you to speak to your children about Internet safety and suggest they entertain themselves in other ways such as reading or playing a game.

The school has a 'No Hat, No Play' policy, which means that your child will need to sit in the shade if they don't bring a hat to school. This may mean that they can't play with their friends, so please ensure that they remember to bring their hat. This policy is for your child's sun protection.

It's important that students arrive at school before the 8.25am bell. Many students are joining their class lines after the bell, which means they miss the opportunity to settle into the school day and talk with their friends before school, and they may miss vital instructions given by their teacher, so please ensure they are at school between 8.00am and 8.25am.

A reminder that there is a 'Get Reading Right (Synthetic Phonics)' K-2 Parent Information evening on Monday 8 April at 6.00pm in the MMC. A guest speaker, Justin Caban, will explain how spelling and phonics are taught in Years K-2. Thank you to the many parents who have sent an RSVP for the evening. It's wonderful to see so much interest in the event. Parents may still return an RSVP slip to their child's class teacher if they would like to attend.

Lego Wall: playground space is limited at the school so we are looking at creative ways that students can play at recess and lunch. One idea we would like to try is to install a Lego Wall on one of the buildings in the playground. Students would build out rather than upwards in the traditional sense. If any parents have unused buckets of Lego at home that they could donate to the school it would be appreciated. Please send them along to your child's class teacher. Once the Lego Wall is in place we will work out a system for children to use it to avoid overcrowding, and have a few Lego Walls installed if successful.

SPORTS

In PE this year so far we have been covering Athletics in preparation for our Athletics Carnival later this term. We have been covering events such as shotput, discus, javelin, sprints and hurdles. It has been a great opportunity for the students to develop specific skills to this sport and appreciate the work that Olympic Athletes go through to achieve what they do.

Kindy have been working on their gross motor skills – running, balance, jumping and skipping. We have also been trying to incorporate fine motor skill practice in our PE lessons. The pictures below show a

lesson with the Kindy students running up to the string and placing a peg on it, combining both gross and fine motor skills in the one activity.

Sports tokens have been introduced to the primary students. At the end of every lesson, 5 students are given a token for either hard work, a positive attitude, encouraging others, following instructions, playing

fair, being a good sport, and displaying the Maronite values/virtues. The tokens are stickers which the students place next to their names in the sports room. The students with the most tokens at the end of the term are able to receive a lucky dip prize! This has been introduced to try and encourage a positive attitude toward sport and each other while playing a competitive game. In the competitive nature of some games, students forget values such as respect, honesty, and humility, to try and get ahead of others, and they need to understand that a good sport is able to be competitive whilst still upholding those values.

SECONDARY NEWS

The NSW government remains committed to requiring a minimum standard to receive the HSC due to the importance of literacy and numeracy skills for success in everyday life.

From 2018, Year 9 NAPLAN tests are no longer the early way for students to demonstrate the HSC Minimum

Standard. This change has been made to ensure NAPLAN remains focussed on its diagnostic purpose and to reduce unnecessary stress on young people.

If Year 11 students did not get Band 8s or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN tests, they will need to take the

corresponding online tests which will be offered throughout Years 10, 11 and 12. Students will decide with their teacher when they are ready to attempt each test.

From 2019, all students will show they have met the HSC minimum standard by passing online tests of basic

reading, writing and numeracy skills, which are available for them to sit the when they are ready from Year 10 until a few years after Year 12.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

You need reading, writing and maths skills for everyday life after school. This why you are required to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.



To make sure you have the basics right, and show you meet the minimum standard, you need to pass short online tests of everyday reading, writing and maths skills.

- The tests will be available to take at school up to twice a year in Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12, and even after the HSC.
- Sample questions and answers are available online, as well as practice tests and advice from students who have completed the tests.
- Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.
- You do not need to sit the reading, writing or numeracy online test(s) if you achieved Band 8 or above in the respective 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN test(s).

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Some students with disabilities will be eligible for extra provisions for the online tests, or an exemption. Talk to your teachers to determine whether you are eligible for provisions. A Disability Provisions, Exemptions and Appeals policy is available on the NESA website.

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Punctuality ensures that your child is able to start the day calmly as well as not miss out on vital parts of the school day. Persistent lateness affects attendance, as any child arriving to class after 8:30am will be marked as partially absent.

We understand that there may be rare occasions when you are unavoidably late due to unforeseen circumstances; however, children who consistently arrive late are greatly disadvantaged because they miss starting the day with their peers and the beginning of lessons. It is also very important that children establish good routines and habits in preparation for the rest of their lives. Punctuality is a life skill that they need to develop whilst they are young.

It is essential that you ensure that your child arrives at school on time to prevent disruption to your child's own learning and that of others.

REMINDERS

- Students must arrive to school no later than 8:25am
- Students are not to leave school before 3:10pm and early leave must be with permission granted by Year or Stage Coordinators. Exceptional circumstances require a note from parents.
- Ensure correct uniforms are worn
- Boys to have regulation haircuts
- No coloured bands to be worn around necks or on wrists
- Years 3-12 students to have their diaries signed when required
- Parents to make appointments to speak to teachers.
- Playground supervision starts 8am and ends 3:30pm.
